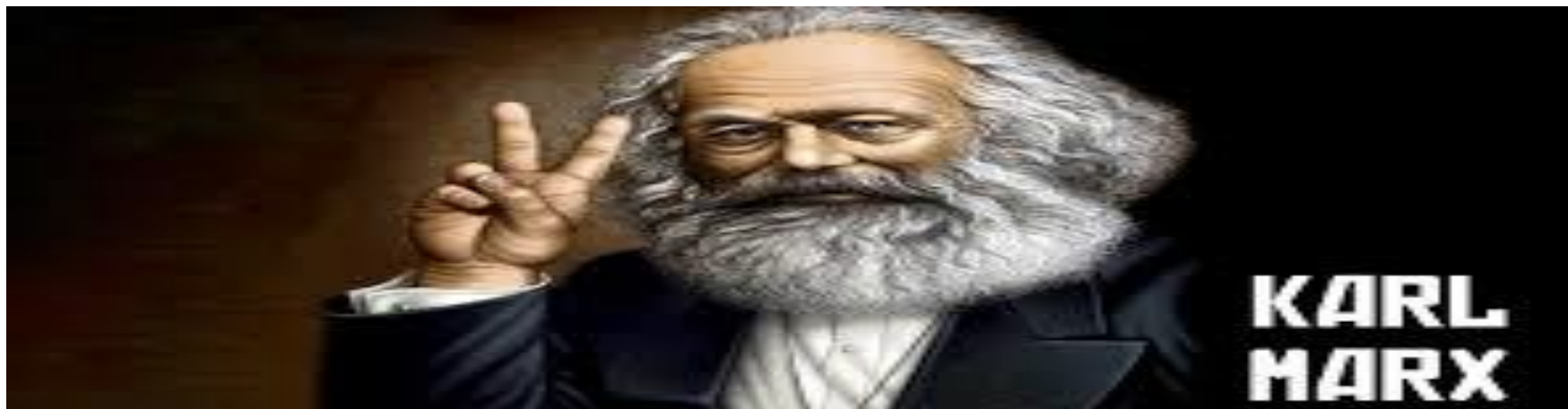


“Peacetime” in the Communist States:
